## **Fees for clinical services of DVS**

The Directorate of Veterinary Services (DVS) announced in a circular (V12 / 2018) on 26 June 2018 that the government had approved the levying of fees for State Veterinary Offices that provide clinical services to the public. These include, amongst other things, hourly fees as well as mileage tariffs when officials must travel to farms.

Following several inquiries from members, the NLU office contacted the DVS this week to ensure that the relevant circular was still in force and that the delivery of clinical services was understood correctly. A senior official of the DVS confirmed that the services are still in force and implemented. In the instance of clinical services, fees are charged on all services, except where compulsory farm inspections are carried out or when services are rendered during the control of state-controlled diseases. ## **Foot-and-mouth disease notice**

The Directorate of Veterinary Services (DVS) announced on 13 January 2021 that from 29 December 2020 to 6 January 2021, new BKS cases occurred in the Ohangwena, Oshana, and Oshikoto regions. The outbreak in the Oshana region is 12 km north of the Etosha.

DVS is currently busy with a campaign to vaccinate animals in the above regions. Funds needed for the fight against the disease and vaccination are astronomical, and there are already requests to use the government's emergency fund.

Since the first outbreaks east and west of Rundu last year, the DVS enlisted the help of the industry. They assisted the LPO, who immediately stepped in and made relentless contributions to curb the spread. The Meat Board and livestock producers helped the DVS, and without hesitation, assisted in the reparation of the veterinary cordon fence (VCF) and to ensure that disinfection facilities at the veterinary checkpoints were functional.

The Chief Veterinary Officer of DVS, Dr. Albertina Shilongo, again this week made a renewed request to the industry for help to get the latest FMD outbreaks under control. The industry was asked to patrol and maintain the VCF to prevent FMD from spreading further south of the VCF. The Outjo and GTO Regional Agricultural Unions are already patrolling the VCF on the southern and northern borders of the Etosha, as it is a priority.

During the LPO's Planning Session in December last year, the maintenance of the VCF was the main point of discussion. Everyone agreed that outsourcing the maintenance and security services on this line is crucial. It is now a matter of urgency that the industry and the authorities devise a plan of action to realize the above.

## **Plant pests and -diseases**

The Ministry of Agriculture, Water, and Forestry announced that they had received reports of plant pests and plagues, such as "koringkrieke" and fall armyworms. The Ministry urges farmers to regularly inspect their fields and report any outbreaks to their nearest agricultural extension workers. The agricultural extension officers will inform farmers which pesticides to use. The Ministry encourages farmers in the ten agronomic producing districts to make use of the crop production program which provides inputs at subsidised prices to producers.

## **Dr. Archie Norval passed away**

When the veteran veterinarian, Dr. Archie Norval, died after a second heart attack on his farm Liabettus, agricultural circles lost a great man.

His grieving wife Limmie told Agriforum that at 76 her husband was still fit and healthy. "Archie had his first heart attack last night at 22:30. The world around us is so wet that we could not venture on the road to get medical help. Today at 03:15 the fatal heart attack followed. I tried heart massage and mouth-to-mouth breathing, but to no avail."

Until his death, dr. Archie was still actively involved in agriculture as Vice-Chairperson of the Meat Board, the Chairperson of the FAN Meat Committee, and the Vice-Chairman of the Animal Health Committee. He was also a member of the Land Reform Advisory Committee from 2010 to 2012.

Paul Strydom, general manager of the Meat Board, says dr. Archie has taken FAN Meat to new heights by streamlining the traceability system, making it more practical, introducing user-friendly online features for farmers, and improving the integrity of the system. Since dr. Archie joined the Meat Board at the beginning of 1995, Paul worked very closely with him, up until 2004 when he was responsible for animal disease control in the country and later as the chief veterinary officer at the state. When he started serving as a board member in the Meat Board in February 2014, they were colleagues again.

"He had a great personality and was incredibly experienced in the meat industry, especially when it came to animal disease control. He was able to communicate his knowledge and insight on animal health, dealing with foot-and-mouth disease (especially in the north), the status of the veterinary cordon fence, and veterinary management south of the red line, easily and meaningfully to colleagues and industry role players. His input will be sorely missed," says Paul. "I have lost a good friend."

Dr. Archie was also a community leader par excellence. Jaco Kotze, who took over the chairmanship of the Stampriet Farmers' Association in 2012 from dr. Archie: "We lost an incredible mentor and icon. He was an intellectual, a strong leader, a man of God, and a father figure to our younger farmers. One could always depend on him. The saddest thing is that so much knowledge is now lost."

His wife Limmie: "He was my dear partner. He was good to me." She adds that this year's generous rains have made them want to farm again. "After Archie became involved with the Meat Board, we sold all our livestock and leased the pasture for five years. The plan was to start farming again this year."

Dr. Archie also leaves behind two daughters, a son, and seven grandchildren. The Meat Board, the Namibia Agricultural Union, and Agriforum pass on their deepest condolences to his next of kin.

## **Meatco Annual General Meeting**

Meatco herewith informs producers that this year's Annual General Meeting (the 34<sup>th</sup> AGM) will be held on 19 February 2021 at the Namibian Institute of Public Administration and Management (NIPAM) in Windhoek.

As per the Meatco Act, Act 1 of 2001, Section 14(8), only registered members of the Meat Corporation of Namibia may attend and vote at the AGM.

The resolution of the 33<sup>rd</sup> AGM stipulates that to qualify for registration as a member of Meatco, as per Section 17(1), a producer must at least sell one unit of livestock to Meatco during the period immediately preceding the date on which his/her/its membership is to be determined, namely, three years for members south of the Veterinary Cordon Fence (VCF) and five years for members north of the Veterinary Cordon Fence (VCF), respectively.
